Our School Curriculum

The staff at the Nursery School have created a detailed curriculum that they use for planning and teaching the children. The Curriculum is on the School's Website (www.rosegrove-nur.lancs.sch.uk/curriculum). In addition to this document we have also written a detailed sequence of learning that helps us to measure if children are meeting their milestones and working at a level that is correct for their age. We can then add additional interventions and teaching groups if children need additional support or highlight children who are working at a higher level. We thought that it may be helpful to share some of our sequence of learning with you so that you can see what your child should be able to do at different ages and stages of development. This month we have chosen to focus on the Subject Area of Personal, Social and Emotional Development (Health and Self-Care). If you would like any further information about our curriculum or you are concerned that your child is not working at the level expected for their age, then please email their Key Worker.

	Children in our Nursery School will learn to:
Exploring	Know where the Nursery bathrooms are located in the building.
	Cooperate with nappy changing routines.
	Communicate when their nappy needs changing.
	Follow a good handwashing routine with adult support.
	Cooperate with dressing and changing.
	Find a Nursery coat to play outside when asked by an adult.
	Drink from a cup without spilling
	Try a variety of different foods.
	Feed themselves using a spoon.

Developing	Use the potty or toilet for the majority of the Nursery day but may still have occasional
	accidents.
	Wash their own hands with little support from an adult.
	Put on their own Nursery Coat and some other simple items of clothing.
	Use cutlery with control, attempting to cut their own food.
	Be involved in preparing healthy foods to eat.
	Manage risk in different Nursery environments, indoors and outside.
	Knows foods which they like/dislike.
Children aged 36 months are expected to be beginning the Confident stage of our Curriculum	
Confident	Use the toilet and wash their hands independently
	Attempt different zips and other fastenings.
	Put on some items of clothing including shoes / wellington boots.
	Be aware of different types of exercise and take part in these with confidence.
	Recognise some foods which are healthy and others which may not be as healthy to
	eat.
	Use basic toys and Nursery equipment safely.
	Knows calm and quiet spaces in Nursery where they can rest if they are tired.
